China made its biggest purchases of U.S. pork in nearly two years, according to USDA. The sale of 23,846 metric tons of U.S pork in the week ended March 7 was the biggest to China since April 2017 and the third largest since USDA began tracking pork export sales in 2013, reported *Reuters*. USDA ordered just 11% of the \$1.2 billion worth of food from **U.S. farmers** that it pledged to purchase due to tariff disputes with China, Mexico and Canada as of Feb. 5, according the Midwest Center for Investigative Reporting. An analysis found that 39% of the open trade mitigation bids had only one bidder, of the 59 USDA-approved meat vendors only 16 have bid on trade mitigation orders, and 1,015 orders went unfulfilled due to bidders already selling their products or others simply did not bid, reported *St. Louis Post-Dispatch*.
