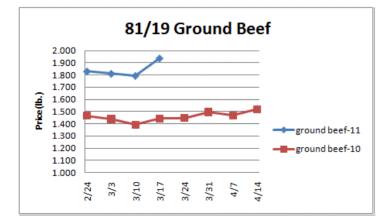

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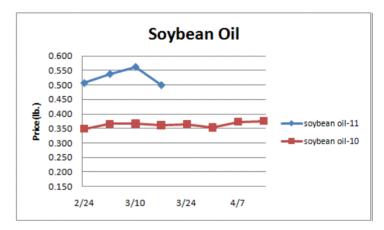
Beef - Beef production last week declined 1.3% but was 3.4% larger than the prior year. Beef output is anticipated to seasonally trend higher later next month. Many of the beef markets remain firm due to building spring grill demand and solid export sales. Further beef middle meat prices increases may be forthcoming. US beef imports during January were 19% less than last year and the 2nd smallest for any month in the last 20 years. Fairly light US beef imports could persist which would be supportive of lean boneless beef trimming prices. Elevated beef trimming markets are likely to endure. Price USDA, FOB per pound.

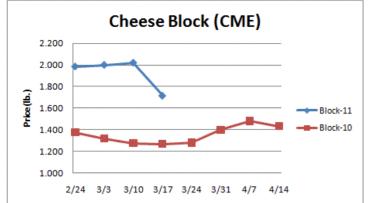

Dairy-What goes up must come down. Spot CME cheese and nearby milk futures have declined 10% plus in the first 3 days of this week. Butter futures have weakened as well as the trade anticipates lower spot butter prices in the coming months. Further, the international dairy markets are lower this week. Buyers are delaying spot cheese and butter purchases but buyers have been active in procuring cheese and milk futures for later this spring. Additional spot butter and cheese market declines may be impending. Still, any further depreciation may only be modest. Prices per pound, except Class I Cream (hundred weight), from USDA.

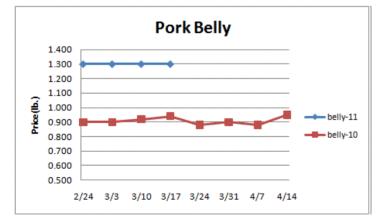

Pork-Pork output last week rose .7% and was 3.2% larger than the same week a year ago. Pork production is anticipated to seasonally trend lower in the coming weeks. January US pork exports were 18% more than last year with about a third of the increase driven by a surge in trade with South Korea. Pork exports to Japan could lessen for the short term but we anticipate relatively strong pork exports to return thereafter. Many pork markets have weakened. Most pork markets typically move upward during April. Prices USDA, FOB per pound.

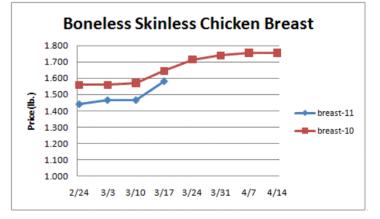

Poultry-January US chicken exports were just .5% more than the prior year and significantly less than months this past fall. This is due in large to a notable cut in trade with Russia. Chicken export trade is reported to be brisk which is supporting the rise in the chicken leg quarter market. Inflated dark meat chicken prices could persist this spring. The chicken breast markets are seasonally firming but remain below year ago levels. Elevated beef and pork prices could lead to notable chicken feature activity this spring which may influence the chicken breast markets higher. Usually, the boneless skinless chicken breast market rises about 11% during the next 9 weeks. The chicken wing markets appear to be finding a bottom. Prices USDA, FOB per pound except when noted.

Seafood-Strong US shrimp prices appear to be encouraging imports. US total shrimp imports during January were 8.7% larger than last year. Shell on shrimp imports during the month were 2.4% more than 2010. The shrimp markets remain firm. However, if solid imports continue we may experience modestly lower shrimp prices in the coming months. January salmon filet/steak imports were 10% less than the previous year.

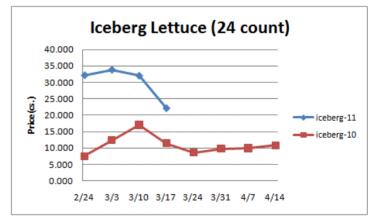

Produce-Lettuce supplies are slowly improving. Further, lettuce demand has dampened. Thus, lettuce prices are moving lower. Overall lettuce supplies are anticipated to remain subpar for the next several weeks which could cause the lettuce markets to remain above normal price levels. Tomato supplies are expected to be limited for the rest of this month but slowly improve as April gets underway. Lower tomato prices may be forthcoming next month. March 1st US potato stocks were 15% less than last year and the smallest for the date in over 10 years. Prices USDA FOB shipping point unless noted (terminal).
