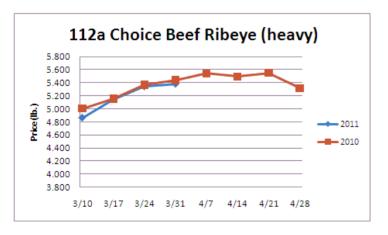

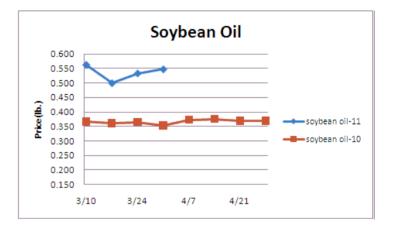
Beef - Beef production last week expanded 2.2% from the previous week and was 2.3% more than the same week a year ago. Beef output could be slowed some during the next week or two due to the recent turn higher in spot cattle and cattle futures. Usually some key beef grill item markets including the strip and top butt markets as well as the USDA choice beef cutout market top sometime in the mid spring as demand peaks for the grill season. Due to the relatively inflated beef prices and rising gasoline prices we would not be surprised to see these appropriate markets peak early this year. Price USDA, FOB per pound.

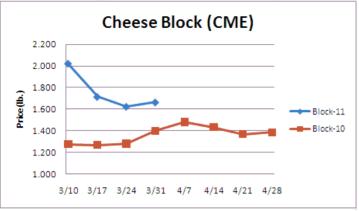

Dairy-The CME cheese markets are mixed as buyers attempt to secure product for the coming months. Futures markets are suggesting that cheese could settle in the high \$160's. Unless we get a notable uptick in international cheese prices the low \$170's could put a lid on this rally. The butter market remains firm. Butter supplies could slowly improve during the next few months which eventually could put some modestly downward pressure on the butter market. Feed prices for milk farmers are projected to be a record high this year which could temper dairy supply growth. Prices per pound, except Class I Cream (hundred weight), from USDA.

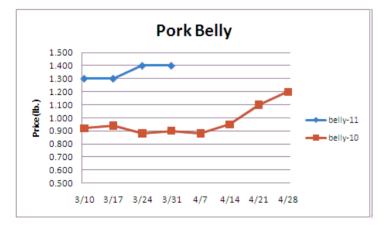

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Pork-Pork output last week declined .9% and was 1.1% less than the same week a year ago. The March USDA hog and pigs inventory was .6% larger than last year while the breeding herd was .5% bigger than 2010. The swine breeding herd increased from December to March marking the first such occurrence since 2007. These statistics point toward pork production gains compared to 2010 later this year. Strong exports continue to support pork prices. The ham markets may correct lower soon. Prices USDA, FOB per pound.

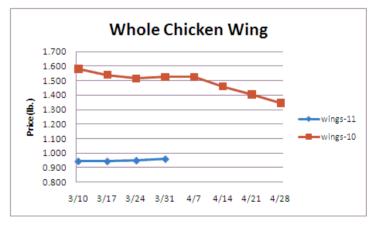

Poultry-Chicken production in recent weeks has been trending about 1% better than a year ago. Chicken output in April is anticipated to track 2 to 3% above 2010 which could temper any pending seasonal chicken market increases. Usually in April, the boneless skinless chicken breast (4%) and chicken leg quarter (9%) markets appreciate. Conversely, the chicken wing markets typically decline about 5% during April. The chicken wing markets are trading at some of the lowest price levels for this time of the year since 2003. We believe chicken wings are a value here and look for higher price levels later this year. We also believe the chicken breast markets may be a value here as well although not to the same extent as wings. Prices USDA, FOB per pound except when noted.

Seafood-Seafood demand in Japan has declined considerably since the earthquake/tsunami which was anticipated. Consequently, shrimp prices in the country have declined by 30%. We would not be surprised to see some pending weakness in US wholesale seafood prices in general. Shrimp prices could soften some. Still, once Japan's demand starts to rebound look for this to add upward pressure to many seafood markets.

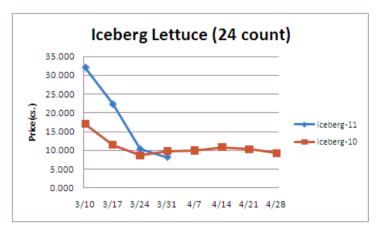

Produce-Heavy rain has caused some flooding in the Salinas produce fields in California. The weather is forecasted to improve this week in the area, however, the crops there could be delayed. This could cause some significant supply gaps for certain produce items including lettuce next month. Lettuce supplies for today's business are relatively adequate. Still, the downside risk in the lettuce markets from here may be nominal. The tomato markets continue to trade at inflated levels. Modestly lower tomato prices are anticipated as April progresses.
