

#### **Market Commentary**


Commentary: The rather odd winter weather pattern in the U.S. has produced many concerns. For starters, snow is water storage in the North. While the melting of the snow last year, did cause quite a bit of flooding during the regular planting season, it is necessary to hold water and replenish the aquifers. The good side to this is that there will likely be no issues getting the crops planted this year. Also there is a concern that the crazy weather patterns may continue and that the drought in Oklahoma and Texas could continue this year. Thankfully, there has been some winter rains in these regions. The soy complex ended last week much stronger. There was some good export demand from China bolstering the close. Last week's corn export also showed significant gains for China, as it is believed that they have depleted much of their corn supplies and Brazil is not able to keep up with the Chinese demand due to their own supply and delivery issues. The U.S. will likely pick up a lot of Chinese demand. The premium added to the end of last week's corn contract is likely due to the demand from China. Ending stocks for corn and beans are not very favorable currently.

Corn futures closed between \$6.58-3/4 and \$6.73 per bushel, ending the week at \$6.73. Soybean futures closed between \$13.30-1/2 and \$13.74 per bushel, ending the week at \$13/74. Soybean meal futures closed between \$358.40 and \$374.40 per short ton, ending the week at \$374.40. Soybean oil futures closed between \$0.5363 and \$0.5550 per pound, ending the week at \$0.5550. Wheat futures closed between \$6.43-3/4 and \$6.72 per bushel, ending the week at \$6.72.






#### **Soybeans - CBOT Weekly Average Price - Dollars / Bushel**







# Soybean Meal - CBOT Weekly Average Price - Dollars / US Ton


















#### **Barrel Cheddar - CME Average Weekly Price / Pound**












#### **Live Cattle - Average Weekly Price USDA - 6 State Average**






























#### **Heating Oil - Average Weekly Spot Price - NY Harbour**









# **Gasoline Unleaded - Average Weekly Highway Price**







