## Southeast

### Proposals for Yellowtail Snapper and Groupers

By **June 24**, [submit your comments](#) on NOAA Fisheries' proposed actions in Amendment 15 to the South Atlantic Snapper-Grouper Fishery Management Plan. The rule proposes increases to catch levels for yellowtail snapper and modifications to commercial grouper management measures.

## Southwest

### Pacific Council Considers 2015-2016 Management

The Pacific Fishery Management Council and its advisory bodies will meet June 18-25 to address issues related to groundfish, highly migratory species, ecosystem-based management, and habitat.

### Net Cameras Add New Dimension to Viewing Fish

Scientists at the Southwest Fisheries Science Center developed a camera system that can be installed in trawl nets to observe fish behavior and the performance of marine mammal excluder devices. Tests of the net cameras provided hours of video footage of sardines, jack mackerel, squid, and other fishes, and also documented a sea lion being excluded from the trawl.

## Northwest Science Center's Message in a Bottle

Last month, Alaska resident Mike Makar discovered a message-bearing bottle that had been floating in the Pacific Ocean since 1966. The bottle was one of thousands released by the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, the predecessor of NOAA Fisheries', in an effort to track ocean currents using the technology of the day.

## Video: Returning Salmon Improve Life in Eastern Washington State

In southeast Washington State, the combined efforts of federal agencies and a local salmon recovery board to improve salmon habitat have contributed to improved steelhead returns, providing significant economic benefits to the communities that depend on them.

### Technical Memo: Variation in Steller Sea Lion Diet

Reduced availability of prey, due to commercial fishing or environmental degradation, might have contributed to the sharp decline in western Alaska's Steller sea lion populations in the 1980s. This study seeks to understand trends in the sea lions' diet in hopes of identifying drivers of population health.
