


Market Commentary

Commentary: The USDA lowered the amount of corn stocks on its last report effectively stopping the downward trend of corn prices. Previously, corn stocks had increased by leaps and bounds, and demand was down, which caused corn to falter. Supply and Demand is easy to track on no. 2 corn as production was up over 20% and herd sizes were up only 3%. The cold winter weather this year has increased the demand for cattle but that comes in short spurts, but does help the farmer. Soybeans and meal are tracking very well. Demand for meal is high and crush margins are encouraging crushers to make more meal. China has been buying up U.S. beans at a large clip. We are very tight on soybeans. Since corn has rebounded, it is likely that farmers will switch over largely to soybeans this year. This of course produces more soybean oil and so bean oil prices have fallen below 37 cents providing some relief here. Canola prices have also fallen. Farmers reaped the largest Canola crop in history, so naturally prices are down. Canola prices are inching closer to soybean oil prices. It is a good time to look at Canola. Keep an eye on South America's crop this year. Weather has been good and they are their soybean planted acreage has eclipsed the U.S. If the U.S. farmers do what I think they will, which is to plant lots of beans, bean prices will fall dramatically following the potential SA crop. This is all speculation at this point, but early indicators are that farmers will plant beans instead of corn.










Soybeans - CBOT Weekly Average Price - Dollars / Bushel





































Live Cattle - Average Weekly Price USDA - 6 State Average













































