






Beef- Beef production last week rose 1.8% but was 4.1% smaller than the same week a year ago. Limited cattle supplies are anticipated to restrict beef production throughout April. The March 1 cattle on feed inventory was .6% less than last year. However, cattle placements into feedlots during February were 14.7% larger than 2013. The near slaughter ready cattle herd is projected to be much closer to the prior year level in June which could help bring some modest price relief to the beef markets. In the meantime, most of the grill item beef markets including ground beef, top butt and strips could remain historically inflated. Typically these markets peak in late April to early June. Price USDA, FOB per pound.


Dairy-The CME spot cheese markets continue to trade at inflated levels with both the cheese block and barrel markets setting new record highs this week. This is due in part to cold weather slowed milk output in the Midwest during the last several months. The December through February average temperature in Wisconsin was the lowest since 1978. February 28th cheese stocks were 5.5% less than last year but the third largest for the date since 1984. February butter holdings were 31% less than 2013. Lower butter prices are anticipated in the coming months. Prices per pound, except Class I Cream (hundred weight), from USDA.

Pork - Pork production last week rose 1% but was 3.5% less than 2013. Tight hog supplies due to PEDV are anticipated to persist through the spring. Many of the pork markets have soared as various buyers attempt to secure stocks to protect against a pending supply shortfall. Inflated pork prices are likely to persevere. February 28th pork belly holdings were 108% larger than last year's depleted level. Better stocks may temper any further belly market gains. Prices USDA, FOB per pound.



Poultry- Chicken output for the week ending March 15th rose 4.2% but was .5% smaller than the same week a year ago. Chicken production could trend close to 2013 levels in the near term. The February broiler type chick hatch was .1% smaller than the previous year. Better chicken output versus 2013 is anticipated later this spring as chicken producer margins have greatly improved during the last month. Further, the broiler hatchery flock is expected to be more than 1% larger than last year by June. The USDA is forecasting spring U.S. chicken production to be

3.3% larger than the prior year. This eventually could bring some price relief to the chicken markets. Additional chicken breast market increases are likely in the meantime. Chicken breast prices usually move 5% higher during April. Prices USDA, FOB per pound except when noted.






Produce- Limited tomato supplies in the east are bringing support to the tomato markets. Florida tomato shipments last week declined 25% and were 39% smaller than the same week last year. The Florida tomato harvest could remain subpar into early April which may cause relatively inflated tomato prices to persist. Lettuce supplies remain ample as the chief harvest area transitions to the Huron California region. Better lettuce demand with the improving spring temperatures could increase lettuce prices in the coming weeks. Higher potato prices may be forthcoming as well.
