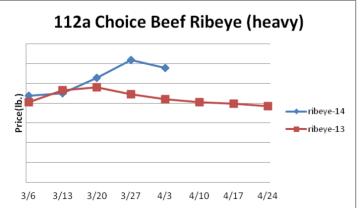




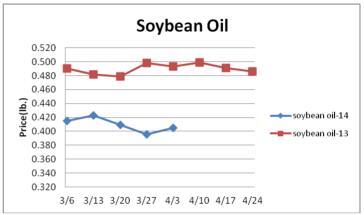
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**Beef-** Beef output last week increased 1.6% but was 1% less than the same week a year ago. 2014 beef production to date is tracking 6.3% below the previous year. Tight cattle supplies are anticipated to restrict beef production throughout the next few months which should be generally supportive of the beef markets. However, cattle supplies during the late spring may be closer to 2013 levels. The beef markets are softening some due mostly to consumers pushing back on the record high retail beef prices. Lethargic beef demand may persist which could bring an early spring grilling season top to many beef markets. Lower beef prices are expected later this spring. Price USDA, FOB per pound.

**Dairy**-The CME spot butter market reached its highest level this week since September 2011. Solid seasonal demand for Easter and strong exports have been supportive of butter prices as of late. However, international butter prices are starting to decline with the Fonterra Global Dairy Trade auction price this week falling to a three month low. The butter market is anticipated to depreciate in the coming weeks. The CME cheese markets remain elevated but international cheese prices are depreciating as well. Cheese price relief is expected later this spring. Prices per pound, except Class I Cream (hundred weight), from USDA.

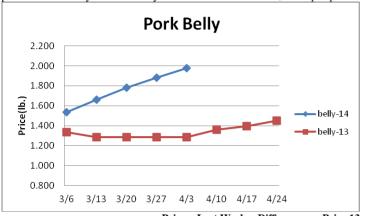

**Pork** - Pork output last week declined .3% and was 4.3% smaller than the same week a year ago. According to the USDA, the March 1 U.S. hog and pigs inventory was 3.3% less than last year. The market hog inventory during the next six months is projected to be 3.7% smaller than 2013 due mostly to PEDv. This should limit pork production and underpin pork prices. Still, the bulk of the spring seasonal gains in the pork markets may have already occurred. Prices USDA, FOB per pound.

**Poultry-**Chicken production for the week ending March 22nd rose .1% but was 2.1% less than the same week a year ago. Chicken producers have slowed chicken output due to challenges with margins in the early winter. Chicken producer profits have risen sharply as of late which should lead to strong gains in chicken production later this spring. Due to the curbed output and inflated beef and pork prices, the chicken markets have continued to firm. The ARA Boneless Skinless Chicken Breast

Index has risen 26% during the last five weeks to its highest level since September. Further, modest chicken breast prices increases are projected this month. Still, once chicken output begins to rebound it could bring a quick top to the chicken breast markets. Chicken wing prices may peak this spring as well. Prices USDA, FOB per pound except when noted.

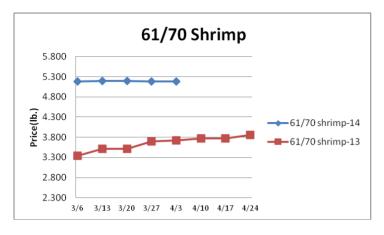

Newfoundland snow crab fishing will get underway soon. Usually snow crab leg prices decline during the spring. Last year the 5-8 ounce snow crab leg market fell 6% during April. 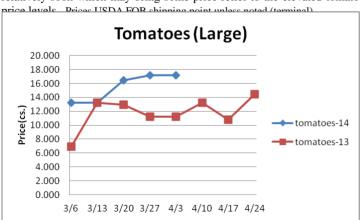

Produce- The lettuce markets continue to track near historically engaging levels for buyers. The chief lettuce harvest area will transition to the Salinas, California area later this month. No major supply gap is anticipated during this supply shift. However, better weather should cause lettuce demand to improve in the coming weeks which could bring a lift to lettuce prices. The tomato markets are inflated due to a curbed harvest in Florida. Tomato supplies from Florida are expected to escalate relatively soon which may bring some price relief to the elevated tomato
