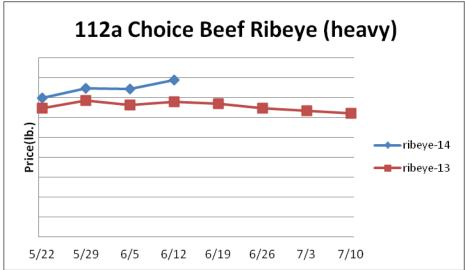
Beef, Veal and Lamb Report

Beef, Veal & Lamb-Beef output last week was 5.2% less than the same week a year ago. Historically limited cattle supplies are expected to cause beef production to continue to track well below 2013 levels for the next several months. U.S. beef imports during April were 17% larger than the prior year and the biggest for any month since July 2007. Further, beef imports during the month outpaced domestic beef exports by the most in nearly five years. Typically, this would be a good sign for lower lean beef trim prices. However, reduced domestic cow slaughter could limit any seasonal declines in 90% beef trim prices this summer. Modestly lower 50% beef trim prices may be impending. Price USDA, FOB per pound

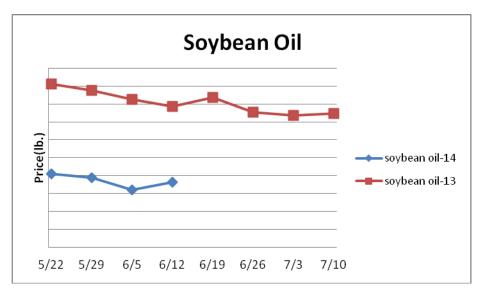

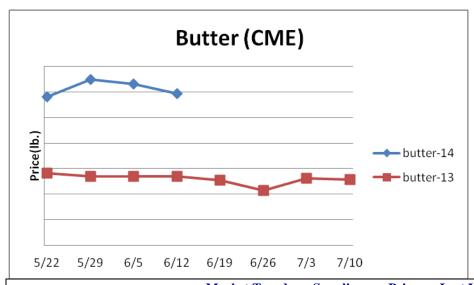

Dairy Report

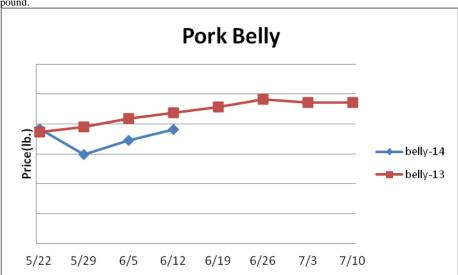
Dairy-The CME butter market has softened during the last week but still remains inflated. Although the greater price risk in butter from here is to the downside, attempts by producers to build inventories in front of this year's holiday season may limit any butter price depreciation in the near term. During April, U.S. butter exports were historically large but the smallest for any month since June 2013. The CME cheese markets are seasonally firming. Yet, milk production in the Midwest has been strong as of late which should limit any further cheese price inflation in the near term. Pork Report

Pork - Pork production last week was 1.1% larger than a year ago despite hog slaughter falling to its lowest level for any non-holiday week since June 2006. Hog supplies are expected to tighten considerably during the next several weeks due to PEDv which should generally be supportive of the pork markets. The pork belly market has climbed to a six week high this week. Further pork belly market increases are anticipated into the summer. Prices USDA, FOB per

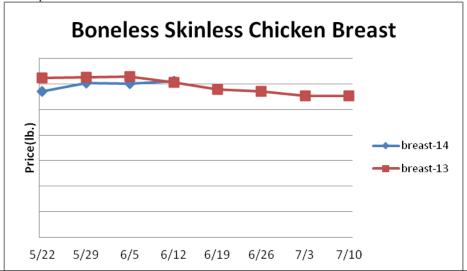

Poultry Report

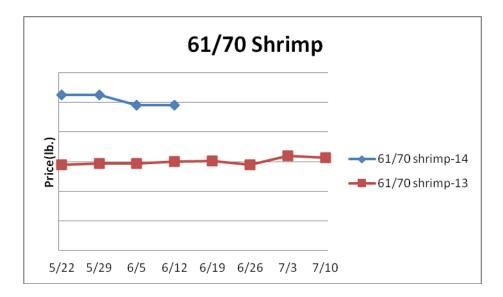
Poultry- Chicken production for the week ending May 24th rose 2.3% and was .4% larger than the same week a year ago. Year to date chicken output is tracking .6% below 2013. Chicken producer margins have improved considerably this spring due to rising chicken prices and lower feed markets. Eventually this should lead to chicken production expansion versus the previous year. The USDA is forecasting third quarter chicken output to be 1.5% better than last year. This, and seasonally waning demand, could put downward pressure on the chicken breast markets. Still, any chicken breast market depreciation may be tempered by solid demand brought on by inflated beef and pork prices. The chicken wing markets usually appreciate during the next several months. Prices USDA, FOB per pound except when noted.

Seafood - Shrimp supplies remain restricted. U.S, shrimp imports during April were 11.5% more than the previous year but the second smallest for any month since June 2013. Shrimp shipments from the world's largest exporter, Thailand, were the smallest for the month in the last 15 years. Relatively inflated shrimp prices are anticipated to persevere this summer. 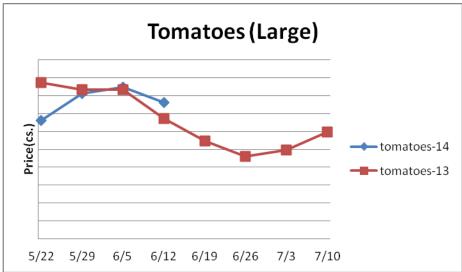

Produce - Lettuce supplies remain limited due to earlier weather challenges. Iceberg lettuce shipments last week declined slightly from the prior week and were 11.6% less than the same week a year ago. Some modest price relief in the lettuce markets could occur later this month. Tomato prices have been well supported as of late as well. The chief eastern tomato harvest area will transition north a few times this summer which could bring some temporary supply gaps. Tomato prices may be erratic as a result. The avocado market may modestly firm in the coming weeks. Prices USDA FOB shipping point unless noted (terminal).
