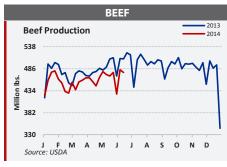




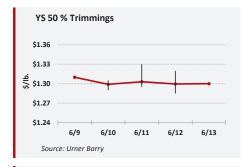


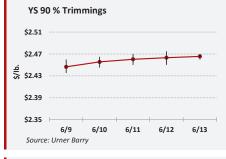


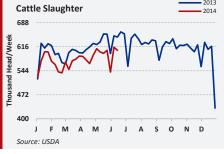


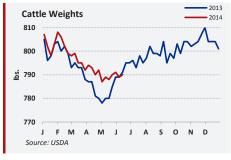












BEEF COMMENTARY

Increased raw material costs were one of the factors that contributed to stronger cutout values. Although demand for quick ship is rated average at best, packers have done a good job of selling forward, indicated by the growing percentage of formula sales.

LIVE CATTLE: Packers upped their bids quite a bit on Thursday, pushing them to levels that cattle owners agreed would buy their offerings. Live cattle trade was established at \$147/cwt to \$148/wt in the South, \$148/cwt to \$150/cwt sold the live animal in the North. The range of sales for the live animal was \$2-\$3/cwt up from last week. The dressed carcass exchanged ownership at \$235 to \$239/cwt, up mostly \$5/cwt from week prior sales. The current CattleFax 6-State Fed Steer price at \$148.45/cwt is 23% higher from the same week last year which was \$120.50/cwt.

SLAUGHTER & BEEF PRODUCTION: The weekly F.I. Slaughter was assessed at 605,000 head, slipping 9,000 lower from week prior's kill under inspection. Saturday's harvest reported at 31,000 head. This year's 605,000 kill represents a 6.5% reduction from last year's 644,000 in the same week. Live cattle weights edged 1 pound lower to 1301 pounds; dressed carcass weights gained a pound, now tipping the scales at 790.

RIBS: Rib values surged higher, attributed in part to buyers procuring last minute inventory prior to both this weekend's Fathers Day celebration as well as the upcoming July 4th holiday.

CHUCKS: Support for chucks was largely seen from demand for ground beef processing. As seen with the other primals, hefty price increases paid for slaughter-ready cattle played into advanced offering prices as the week came to a close.

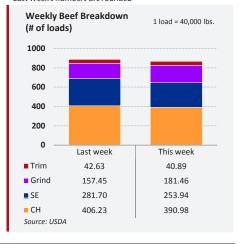
ROUNDS: Rounds realized higher wholesale values as packers pushed offering prices higher to compensate for higher priced cattle. Ground beef processing also lent to clearing of wholesale supply.

LOINS: Throughout most of the week, loin values were under a bit of negative pressure. A slight bounce higher was seen as the week closed, as sellers adjusted their offerings to hopefully offset the increased price of cattle. Peeled tenderloins however, were not able to find the last minute support as the week closed.

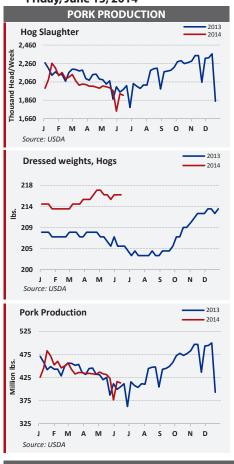
BONELESS BEEF: Fresh 90s were steady to a little firmer on the week. Price levels trended higher as the week progressed. Nearby demand was reportedly active in some areas. Fresh 50s were about steady on the week. Availability varied from source to source. This week's cattle slaughter was estimated at 605,000 head, down 9,000 from the previous week.

PORK COMMENTARY

Limited slaughter schedules due to thinning hog supplies resulted in higher markets for both livestock and wholesale pork. In the bellwether lowa-Southern Minnesota area, the weighted average gained 5.9 percent to \$116.66/cwt. At the same time, Urner Barry's pork carcass cutout gained over 4.4 percent, going from \$113.381/cwt last Friday to \$118.374/cwt this Friday. Operating margins remained positive, with the Urner Barry pork packer margin index ranging between \$3.84 to \$9.62/head.

PORK PRODUCTION: Total pork production for the week ending June 14, 2014 was estimated at 413.2 million lbs. This total was .7 percent below last week and 3.4 percent above the same week a year ago. Average hog weights, at 287 pounds, were even with last week and 13 pounds over last year.

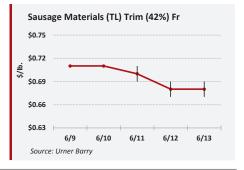
HAMS: The reduced slaughter schedules this week helped support most retail and processing pork products. Hams were no exception and had a strong showing throughout the week. 20 to 23lb hams gained 8.6 percent or \$10/cwt while 23 to 27lb hams gained 8 percent or \$9/cwt. Exports to Mexico are also considered supportive.

BELLIES: Bellies saw consistent gains throughout the week as well, with demand for fresh and limited supplies helping to buoy the market. As a result, 12 through 20lb bellies appreciated by 2.8 to 5.3 percent or \$4 to \$8/cwt. Like hams, heavier bellies have been selling at a slight discount due to elevated hog weights.

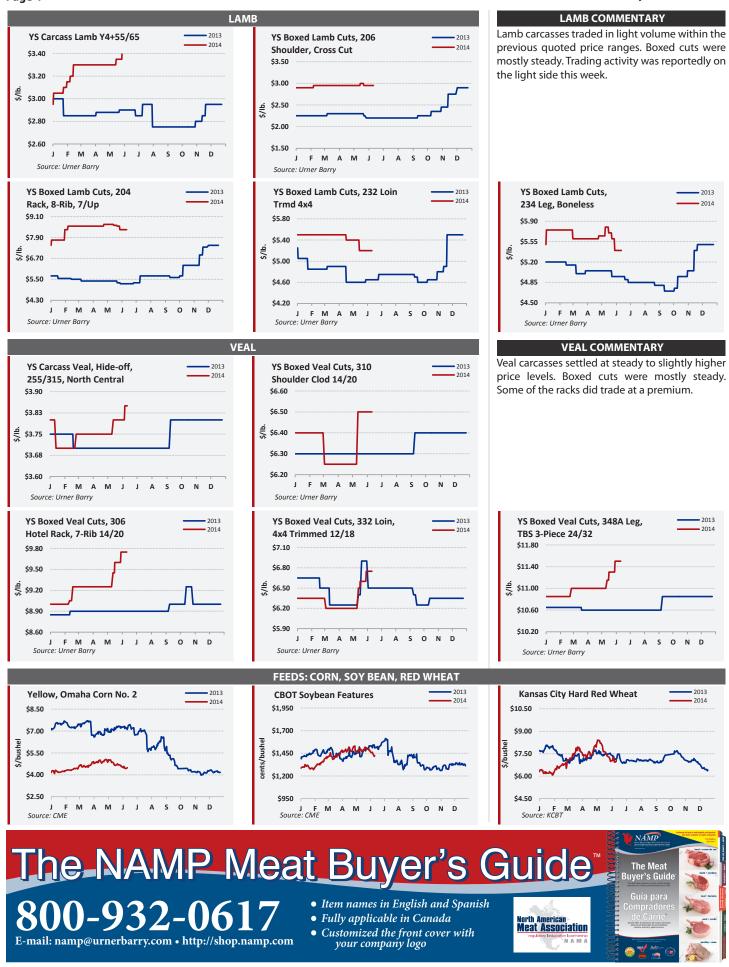
TRIMMINGS: Trim was mixed this week. Abnormally heavy hog weights and a reported lack of Mexican demand resulted in additional 42 percent trim on the market. Accordingly, they lost nearly 7 percent or \$5/cwt by Friday. Contrarily, fresh 72's and boneless picnic trim both gained over 2 percent or \$3 and \$4/cwt respectively on demand for pizza topping and summer sausage demand.

RETAIL: Sellers entered the week with some meat to sell and mixed opinions on market direction. However, as the week wore-on, supplies of most lines dried-up, leading to full steady to firm trade throughout most of the complex. There were some exceptions; boneless loins seemed to be problematic for a number of sellers, as did cushion meat. Bone-in loins continued to move well, and as a result, were up as much as \$9.00/cwt this week. Bone-in centers gained \$5.00 to \$6.00/cwt, while more modest gains and wide ranges developed on boneless loins; the result of carried inventories. The balance of the category was mixed. The picnic held, but as previously mentioned, cushion meat was under pressure; trading down \$10.00/cwt this week. Butts received some weaker calls on Monday, but as the week wore-on and discounting became less pervasive, the market actually began to gain; this week, up \$2.00 to \$4.00/cwt. Interest in spareribs finally surfaced as summer month usage is expected to pick-up. This week, sparerib values rose between \$4.00 and \$9.00/cwt. Meanwhile, St. Louis Ribs continued steady to weak, and Loin Back Ribs steady

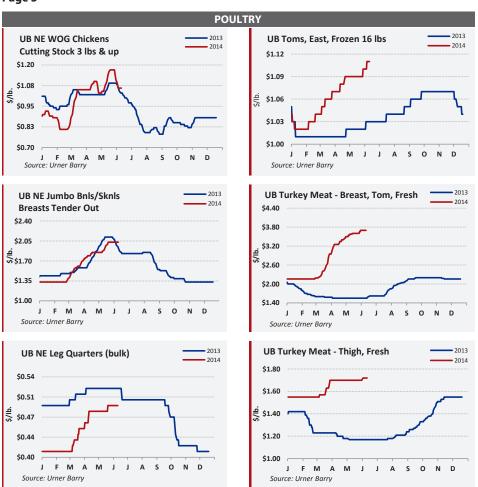




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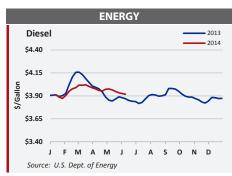


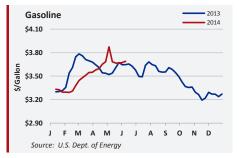
POULTRY COMMENTARY

As this week comes to an end, it's become clear that certain items throughout the chicken complex are going to cost buyers a little extra money on the spot market. Wing supplies have tightened up and are now rated barely adequate at best. Sellers have shown that they are not willing to discount and trading levels are advancing for both whole and cut forms. Thighs and thigh meat finish the week in a similar position. Boneless breasts and tenders are better balanced than they were earlier in the week. Trading levels have righted themselves as they are now within a reasonable range of our listed quotations. Whole birds and WOGs settled as the week progressed. Offerings are now no more than adequate to even short at some points of sale. The majority of reported trades indicate that our listed quotations are fully supported at this time. Leg quarters continued to move regularly at market related values, with very little fluctuating taking place during negotiations. Leg meat continued to show signs of softness. MSC finished the week rated at least steady and many feel that it may be poised for another bump next week.

It was another semi-quiet week for the turkey complex with only a few market changes

here and there. Frozen drum supplies were barely adequate to short at most points of sale. Asked and paid prices for domestic and export destinations advanced almost daily. Fresh drums were more available and rated about steady at best. Whole wings and necks did not improve their situation all week, in fact, their stance may have even slipped a bit. Trading levels were no better than market related to slight discount. Tails were mostly steady. The raw materials were at a sort of standstill as very little spot market activity took place. Breast meat and tenders were trading within range of our listed quotations with only a few market related or MDOS premiums reported. Sources suggested that neither item experienced the same levels of extreme premiums this week that it had in previous weeks. The trims and related meats continued to receive a strong call. Supplies were rated no better than barely adequate to cover immediate needs. Thigh meat is still found to be well supported. MST remains in solid position. All week, bone-in breast offerings were limited and being held with confidence. Whole bird sales continued to trend higher.







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
