#### **Electronic Monitoring Systems for Pelagic Longline Fishing Vessels - April 20 Deadline for Funds**

Starting June 1, 2015, a vessel with an Atlantic Tunas Longline category permit may not depart on a fishing trip with pelagic longline gear on board unless it has an installed, operable, and certified electronic monitoring system. Vessel owners who would like to take advantage of NOAA Fisheries funds available for paid installation must give notice by **April 20**. ### **Ensuring Best Unmanned Aircraft Practices Around Marine Protected Species**

Unmanned aircraft systems -also known as model aircraft or drones-provide new ways to photograph or film wildlife and natural landscapes. However, if they are not used appropriately, these devices can be disruptive and even harmful to both people and animals. NOAA Fisheries reminds recreational users to keep a safe aerial distance of at least 1,000 feet from marine mammals. Learn more about good drone stewardship around marine animals.

### **Report: What We Know About "Ghost Fishing"**

NOAA's Marine Debris Program, in partnership with the National Centers for Coastal Ocean Science, published a report last week that assesses the current state of science on "ghost fishing" and the derelict fishing gear that causes it. Derelict fishing nets can trap fish for years and, if those fish are of commercial value, "ghost fishing" may lead to a significant loss of revenue for fishermen.

### **Early Warning System for Harmful Algal Blooms**

NOAA partnered with NASA, the Environmental Protection Agency, and the U.S. Geological Survey to transform satellite data on ocean biology into information that can help protect Americans from harmful freshwater algal blooms. The new multi-agency research effort is designed as an early-warning system for toxic and nuisance algal blooms.

### **Understanding the Food Web in the North Pacific Subtropical Frontal Region**

NOAA Ship *Oscar Elton Sette* is underway to survey the central North Pacific subtropical frontal zone. Scientists from the Pacific Islands Fisheries Science Center and the University of Hawaii are surveying the physical and biological environment hundreds of miles north of Oahu to better understand the food web supporting important fish species.

### **Marine Conservation Plan for American Samoa**

NOAA Fisheries announces the approval of a marine conservation plan for American Samoa. The plan is effective through March 31, 2018.

**Snowy Grouper Rule - Open for Public Comment**

By **May 8**, please submit your comments on proposed regulations to implement Amendment 20 to the Fishery Management Plan for the Snapper-Grouper Fishery of the South Atlantic Region. The proposed rule would revise the snowy grouper annual catch limits, commercial trip limit, and recreational fishing season.

**Snapper-Grouper Special Management Zones - Open for Public Comment**

By **May 8**, please submit your comments on Amendment 36 to the Fishery Management Plan for the Snapper-Grouper Fishery of the South Atlantic Region. NOAA Fisheries intends to prepare a draft environmental impact statement analyzing the range of management alternatives in this amendment, which considers implementing special management zones.

**South Atlantic Council Seeks Input on Special Management Zones**

The South Atlantic Fishery Management Council is holding a series of public hearings and a workshop to collect input on areas that could be considered for designation as Spawning Special Management Zones in federal waters off the coasts of the Carolinas, Georgia, and Florida. These management zones are being considered as part of Amendment 36 to the Snapper-Grouper Fishery Management Plan.

**Gulf of Mexico Bryde's Whale - Open for Comment**

NOAA Fisheries announced a 90-day finding on a petition to list the Gulf of Mexico Bryde's whale (*Balaenoptera edeni*) as an endangered distinct population segment under the Endangered Species Act. We found that the petition presented sufficient evidence to warrant a status review. Please submit scientific and commercial information pertaining to this species by **June 5**.

**South Atlantic Council Seeks Scientific Advisors**

The South Atlantic Fishery Management Council is soliciting applications from scientists interested in serving on its Scientific and Statistical Committee and the committee's Socio-Economic Panel. The Council will review applicants at its June meeting. Applications are due **April 19**.

**Overview of South Atlantic Council Upcoming Meetings**

The South Atlantic Fishery Management Council will hold several advisory panel meetings as well as a meeting of the Council's Scientific and Statistical Committee in the coming weeks. Meetings will cover snapper-grouper, mackerel, and shrimp fisheries, as well as policies affecting essential fish habitat and ecosystem-based management. All meetings will be held in North Charleston, South Carolina, and will be available online via live webinar.

## Greater Atlantic

### "Living Shorelines" Approach to Erosion Protection

"Living shoreline" projects, which use a mixture of structural and organic materials to guard a shoreline against erosion, have been gaining popularity in the Mid-Atlantic region as an alternative to traditional hard structure shoreline armoring. A recent example along the lower James River in Virginia incorporates living shoreline elements.

### Small-Mesh Multispecies Specifications - Open for Public Comment

By **April 23**, please submit your comments on actions setting the small-mesh multispecies specifications for the 2015-2017 fishing years, clarifying what measures can be modified in a specifications package, and correcting the accountability measures for northern red hake. These actions are intended to set catch and possession limits for upcoming fishing years and to reduce the risk of continued overfishing of red hake.

### Groundfish Exempted Fishing Permit - Open for Public Comment

By **April 23**, please submit your comments on an application for an Exempted Fishing Permit from Atlantic Trawlers Fishing, Inc. The permit would allow up to three commercial fishing vessels to conduct exploratory fishing in year-round groundfish closed areas to obtain fishery-dependent catch data.

### Saint John River Shortnose Sturgeon - Open for Public Comment

NOAA Fisheries found that a petition to identify the Saint John River population of shortnose sturgeon (*Acipenser brevirostrum*) as a distinct population segment and to delist this population under the Endangered Species Act presents sufficient evidence to warrant a status review. Please submit scientific and commercial information pertaining to this petition by **June 5**.

### First Right Whale Mother/Calf Pair Sighting of Season

The Northeast Fisheries Science Center's aerial survey group sighted the first right whale mother and calf pair this season in waters near Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts. This is the mother whale's fourth calf. The sighting triggered a Dynamic Management Area-a temporary, voluntary vessel speed restriction zone designed to protect the whales.

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
